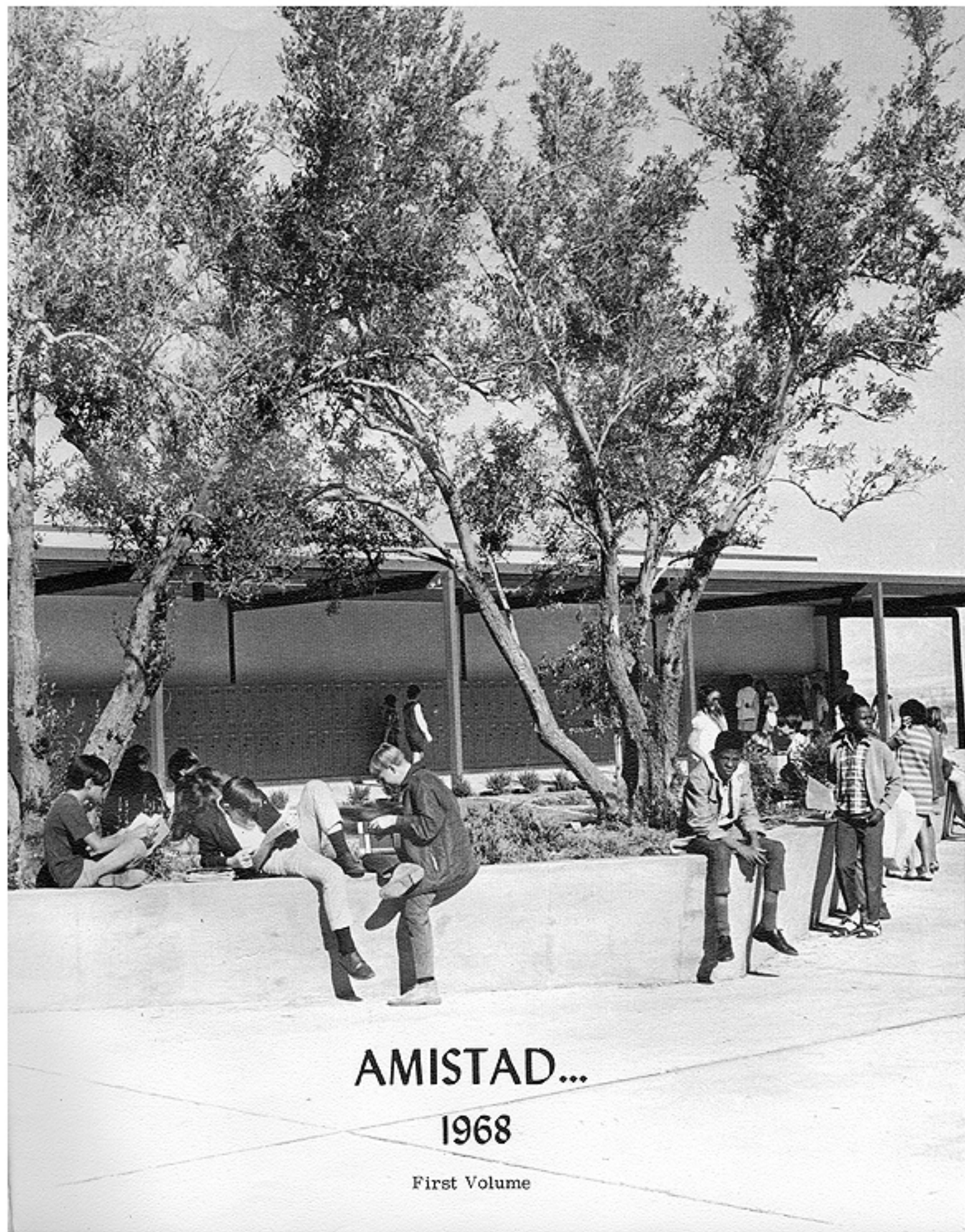

JAMES WORKMAN

James Workman is dedicated to helping prepare boys and girls for adult life. For this reason, and because he was the most responsible for seeing that this new school got off to the best possible start, the student body dedicates this record of the hectic First Year to him.

Little could daunt him this year . . . not the new plant with its unpredictable heating and cooling system, not the "new" faculty with its doubts about flexible schedule, not the "new" students to whom independent study meant free time.

He was born in Logan, West Virginia, July 8, 1927.

Some people believe that the pursuit of knowledge should be never-ending process. In that pursuit, Mr. Workman has attended many schools. His earliest Alma Maters were Logan Elementary School and Mann High School. As to colleges, he has attended Marshall University, Ohio State University, Cal Poly, the University of California at Riverside, and Arizona State University. His Bachelor of Science degree was earned at West-Virginia University, and his Masters degree at California State College, Los Angeles. His undergraduate studies centered in science, with a minor in physical education. He is currently working toward his Doctor of Education at U.S.C.

Mr. Workman was not always a student or an educator, no matter how it may seem. Before teaching, he worked as an auditor at Lockheed Aircraft Company, and he was once an assistant personnel director for Lorrain, Coal and Dock Company, a manufacturing firm in Columbus, Ohio.

What road did he travel that enabled him to become principal of Raymond Cree Junior High? In order to become a public school administrator, a candidate must have had experience in teaching all age levels. Mr. Workman was an athletics coach and taught biology at Mann High School in Logan, West Virginia. He taught physical education and coached at Seabreeze High School, Daytona Beach, Florida. Later, with the Los Angeles City Schools, he taught science at Louis Pasteur Junior High and at Belmont High School. In the desert, he taught sixth grade at Katherine Finchy Elementary School, physical education at Nellie N. Coffman Junior High, and was coach and chairman of the physical education department at Palm Springs High School.

This is Mr. Workman's second administrative position. For the past two years he was principal at Desert Hot Springs Elementary School.

Married for twenty-two years to wife Charlotte, they have two children. Daughter Nancy is twenty, and lives with her husband and baby son in San Diego, California. Son Jim was a senior at Palm Springs High School this year and he has enrolled at San Diego State College.

When asked about a favorite pastime, Mr. Workman mentions sailing. Of all spectator sports, he prefers basketball. Don't be fooled, however; his favorite pastime is really Raymond Cree Junior High School, and his favorite spectator sport is watching students succeed.

RAYMOND CREE

Raymond Cree managed two successful careers in a lifetime of ninety-two years; He was a pioneer realtor in the Palm Springs area, and, for nineteen years, an educator.

Cree was born in Des Moines, Iowa, and died in Riverside, California; the years in between covered a lot of "territory". His father, John Martin Cree, had come to San Jacinto in 1885, seeking relief from asthma. With him had come Cree's mother, Leonora Nagle Cree, and the four children. John Martin Cree established a brick business and became a prominent citizen.

His son, Raymond, was to become even more prominent, and one of the first indications appeared when Cree attended Chaffey College (then affiliated with U. S. C.) where he twice broke the world's record of 51/4 seconds for the fifty-yard dash in inter-scholastic competition.

As an educator, Cree taught in the public schools for seven years and was Superintendent of Schools for Riverside County for twelve years. Between these two had come a two-year intermission when Cree attended Stanford University in 1904 through 1906, and studied public school administration.

Cree was elected to four terms of four years each as superintendent. He completed three of these, the fourth term being interrupted by military service in France during World War I, where he served with General John J. Pershing's Army Educational Corps. When Cree returned to civilian life, ill health forced his resignation as superintendent, and he moved to the desert.

War brought to a close another interest of Cree's. In 1916 he had begun a movement to create a national park which would include the whole of the upper rim of Coachella Valley, including the palm canyons adjacent to Palm Springs, a part of Mount San Jacinto, the Salton Sea, the canyons and palms on the south slope of the Shadow Mountains, and what is now Joshua Tree National Monument. He also hoped for a tramway that would link the valley floor with the top of Mount San Jacinto.

His career as a realtor began in 1915 when he bought sixty-five acres in Section Twenty-Nine, and began planting date palms and grapefruit. Although he sold most of this acreage in small parcels, it is still known as the Old Cree Ranch; the road to it was named Cree Road by the county, and Raymond Drive is nearby, leading off of Highway 111.

Cree's real estate interests were extensive. His earliest subdivision was the Vista Santa Rosa tract, a forerunner of many other Palm Springs area developments where he was either developer, owner, selling agent, or all three. Among these subdivisions were the tracts known as Sol Sonia, Winterhaven Manor, Warm Sands Park, Merita Vista, Palm Canyon Mesa, and Las Palmas Estates. He was proudest of Las Palmas.

Still interested in education, Cree served for many years as a member of both the elementary school board and the Banning High School Board of Education when Palm Springs was a part of the Banning High School District. He led the Movement to divide the two districts as Palm Springs grew.

Cree organized the Palm Springs Lions Club and was its first president. He was a member of the Chamber of Commerce for many years, and was a past president and honorary life-member of the Real Estate Board. Also a charter member of the Desert Riders' Club, and active in other horsemen's organizations, Cree supported the establishment of riding trails. For several years he was a member of the County Planning Commission, and of the Boy Scouts County Council.

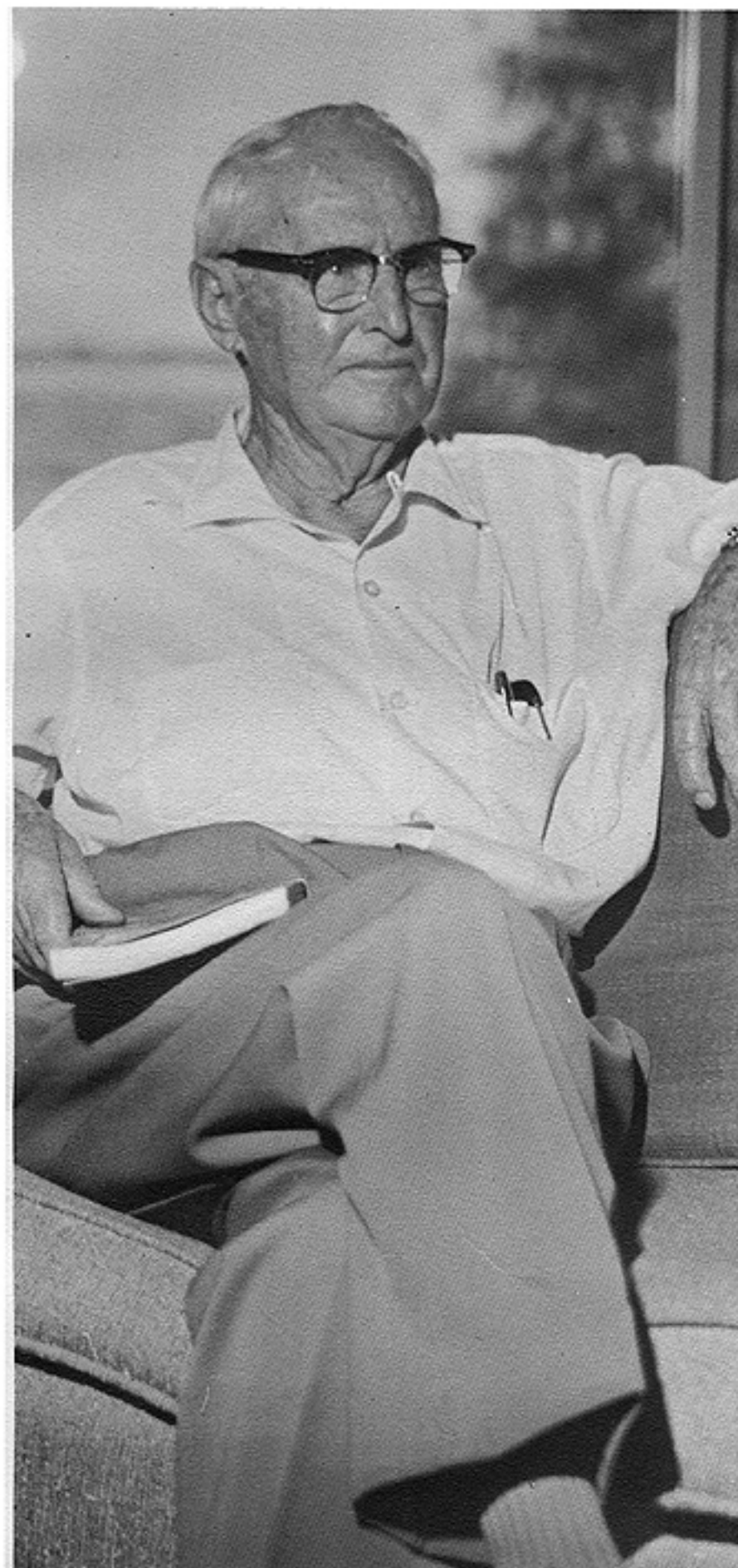
Raymond Cree was Chairman of the Board of the Marsden Foundation for Gifted Youth, founded by his wife and a friend. The foundation was created to aid exceptionally bright students, and to promote understanding between the United States and other countries by giving scholarships in American universities to gifted students from abroad. Such students, having completed their B. A. degrees in their own countries, would come to American colleges for advanced study. Mrs. Cree served as director.

Cree was proud of his two stepsons. Davidson Johnson is a designer and builder of homes in Colorado Springs, Colorado. He held the national two-place glider soaring record one year. Richard H. Johnson, of Grand Prairie, Texas, is a researcher for Chance Vaught in Dallas, Texas. He earned his M. A. degree at Stanford University, and was holder of the single-place glider championship for two years, as well as of the world's distance glider record.

During the later years, Cree and his wife travelled in Europe and the Caribbean Islands. They spent summers in Santa Barbara and winters in Palm Springs.

He is survived by the two stepsons and a number of nieces and nephews. For the past two years, he had been residing with a niece in Riverside.

Hopefully, and happily, the desert will show his influence for a long time. With this first AMISTAD, the student body pays tribute to Mr. Raymond Cree.

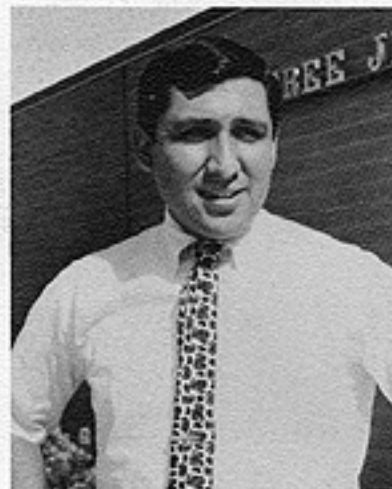

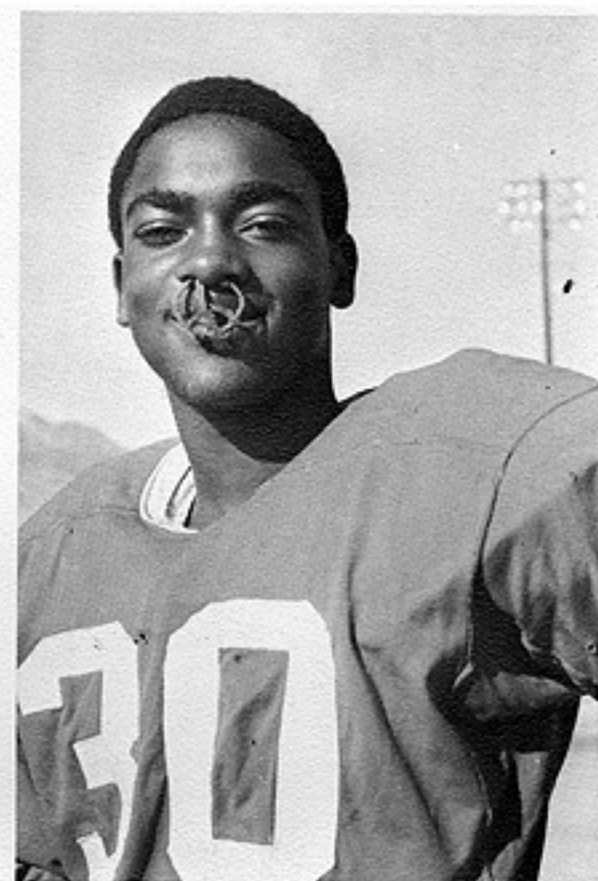

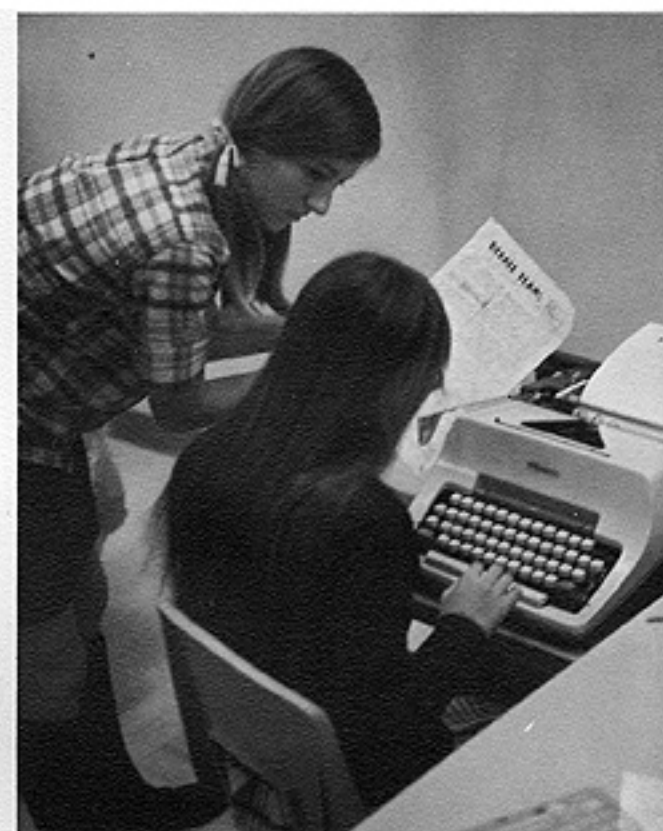
